Hazel Class

Nature Friendly Schools

In January, Miss Carr and Miss Hedge launched the Nature Friendly School project. The aim of this is to get children outside as much as possible, for a range of different lessons, and to develop their well-being. All classes have spent time outside for a range of different lessons, such as science lessons where the children were exercising maths meeting where the children have played time games as well as forming human number lines, art lessons where children have drawn the natural world around them as well as plenty of sensory stories using our amazing new sensory box trail. Looking forward to the next two terms, there are lots of exciting plans for Nature Friendly School and the children will be spending more time learning outside and in our wonderful new geo-dome!



Top Tips for E-Safety at Home

This term's top tip: Pay attention to age ratings on games

“Content within games is regulated and rated into age groups based on elements within the game such as sex, violence, gambling, drugs, in-app purchases etc.” –

What you can do:

Always check the age rating (usually found near the game title)

If the age rating is too high, explain this to your child and help them to find another, more suitable game

Check the 'chat' features on games – even games with a low age rating may let children speak to strangers (see parental control guide link below)

Discuss safe contacts with your children and remind them of the risks of sharing information with people we don't know

Make sure your payment details are not linked to the game account

Talk to your child about what they are playing and show an interest – you might have a lot of fun!

This has helped us to think about the ways that we can make a positive impact in our school.

Maths

This term has been an exciting term across school where a lot of children have achieved their Multiplication Masters certificates. Some children have even achieved their 12 time tables!

There has been some wonderful work on the subject of Time. With a lot of our classes focussed on telling the time to quarter past and quarter to, to the nearest 5 minutes and even to the nearest minute! We hope your children are practising at home too!

It has been a pleasure going into classes and hearing children use their reasoning skills and maths vocabulary to explain what they are doing in their tasks. We are very proud of our learners!



World Book Day



On Thursday 3rd March 2022, we celebrated World Book Day by dressing up as our favourite characters, completing book scavenger hunts and even creating our own books! Once again, children went above and beyond with their costumes for World Book Day and we were fortunate enough to take three children to Waterstones at the Mall to choose a book for their efforts.

It was lovely to see the diversity in characters and books that children chose as their favourites. We had a wonderful Dr Judy Moody, The Boy in the Dress, Ron Weasley and a Cat in the Hat to name but a few!

There were some special commendations for children who created their own characters and even a story to go with this.

It is always one of our most favourite days of the year and we thank you for your effort and support.



Science

The focus for Science week this year was all about 'Growth'.

We started the week with an assembly discussing what it means to be scientists. We 'grew' rainbows during assembly and children were excited to try this themselves.

We also discussed how we grow as humans and also found out that the Eiffel Tower grows in the summer due to the heat!

Each class had the opportunity to be scientists and took part in different experiments across the week, with some classes growing their own plants, some creating rainbows and others exploring how humans grow.



Chestnut Class

This term in Chestnut has been an amazing time! We've written some excellent rhyming poems in English, thinking what we would do if we were the King of a country and had absolute power. The topic for this term has also been a royal one, learning about famous Kings and Queens of England through the ages, and what good (and not so good!) things they have been remembered for. We've even debated about if we would have made the same decisions! The class wrote letters to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, asking her for a number of things, ranging from a lifetime supply of sweets through to pre-release copies of video games! In Maths, we have focussed on learning about decimals, using our previously learnt knowledge of fractions to help us.....all very useful skills to have! Out of the classroom, Chestnut class have been learning Judo every week, and seriously impressing the coach! So as the sun starts to shine on us and the warmth helps us smile, we look forward to next term in Chestnut class.

Beech Class

Over the last two terms in Beech we have had the chance to take part in some exciting extended curricula activities. Every Tuesday we have had the chance to go swimming and test our skills in the water. It was lovely to see the children build their confidence and develop a key life skill in swimming. Every Thursday, we have enjoyed taking part in African drumming sessions. Not only have we had the chance to learn a variety of rhythms but also, we have had the chance to create our own tunes on the drum.

In class we have had a focus on multiplication and division, with some students now being able to recall all the times tables within the national curriculum. With the latter part of the term we have focussed on time. With this being an important life skill, I am excited to see such strong engagement within the class.

English lessons have been very enjoyable with have the chance to visit some classic fairy tales, current sports superstars and even a modern twist on a diary entry. The students have done amazing work learning a variety of story maps and have managed to innovate each one.

I have seen a lot of progress throughout our class and I am so excited to see what terms 5 and 6 bring!

Covid Vaccinations

The NHS is now offering COVID-19 vaccines to children aged 5 to 11 years. Appointments are being held in dedicated children's clinics across our area and can be booked online via the [National Booking Service](#) or by calling 119. Some walk-in clinics are also available and details of these, along with information about all the vaccination options in our area, can be found at www.grabajab.net.

Children's clinics are being run by GPs, community pharmacies and the Vaccination Centre @ UWE Bristol, where themed child-friendly pods have been created to make the Centre feel welcoming for young children.

Uniform


A quick reminder that the uniform consists of
