Hazel Class

Hazel class have worked very hard in terms 5 and 6. We started term 5 by welcoming two new members to the class. We then learned a story about a talking vegetable, created Talk for Writing actions for it and produced our own story. In term 6 we wrote a poem about the lifecycle of a butterfly, where one child's poem ended with a butterfly in a pie!

As we were studying lifecycles in science and writing about them as a poem and an explanation text in English, we were very lucky to have 5 caterpillars. We were able to name them (Binley, Bob, Henley, Rudolf and Jason), watch them grow, turn in to chrysalises and emerge as butterflies. We released them in the Forest School area and will be looking every day to see if they come back and visit us.

In Term 6 our topic, Beachcomber, was all about the seaside. We explored shells, seaweed and some items that should not be in the sea. We experimented to see how quickly items biodegrade and compared the seaside in the past to how it looks now.

In our Maths lessons we have been learning different ways of adding and subtracting and we can now use the column method. We have also been learning our 3- and 4times tables and spotting the links between multiplication and division.

On Wednesday afternoons during term 5 and 6 we have been taking part in 5StarU sessions with coaches from Bristol Bears rugby team, working with Dec and Johnny. We have taken it in turns to lead the warm up and them played team games to earn points.

At the end of this term we will be saying goodbye to six children in class as they move on to secondary school. Please keep in touch and let us know how they are settling in their new schools as we will miss them.

Juniper Class

What a great start to the summer term for Juniper class. We have been learning about life cycles. We explored frogspawn, tadpoles, froglets and then frogs. Then we had some caterpillars in class and we watched them eat all their food and make chrysalis before turning into beautiful butterflies. We then released them and watched them fly away.

What you can do:


Explain why you are using parental controls to your child Remember that parental controls will not protect your children from all inappropriate content so keep an open conversation going

It has been another amazing couple of months in Ash class. The children have started to be challenged more and the topics have last 3 weeks. During this time, we have looked at four different topics; Oceans, Minibeasts, Kings and Queens and Animals.

In Literacy the children have looked at the poem 'The Marine Mammal Boogie', which they performed in the end of term assembly, and the stories 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar', 'The Queen's Handbag' and 'Dear Zoo'. The children have had lots of fun coming up with actions for the texts, performing them to all the staff in school before changing elements of the texts and re write their own versions. At the end of this term, the children will be writing their own versions of 'Dear Zoo' in a book.

In Maths, the children have been looking at money, fraction and shapes. They have completed lots of practical activities and really enjoyed pretending to be in shops to give each other change. Our topic has been very practical, and the children have been on minibeast hunts, been part of sensory stories and have completed lots of arts activities including painting their own ocean scenes, creating their own flags and coat of arms.

In PE this term, as well practicing for sports day, they have been learning Judo with Coach Steve. The children have loved getting involved and trying to get one and other to the mat as well as learning forward rolls and cartwheels. Have an amazing summer!



Aspen Class

"Now that the end of the school year is in sight, it's a time of mixed emotions in Chestnut class. As we prepare for our Year 6s' to move on to their respective Senior Schools, transitions days have become more frequent. To see our children in a new, bigger school fills us with pride and hopes for their future. Our Year 5s in the class look on and are always excited to hear what news there is from the 'big school'!

In class we have been working on a great topic called 'Super Villains and Super Heroes'. Does a hero always wear a cape and have superhuman abilities? It's surprising how many of the children in the class already know a hero in their own community. We have looked at the water cycle in science, creating our own miniature experiments to show how rain is formed using the heat from the sun. English and Maths lessons have continued to teach us essential skills like angles, fractions, punctuation and story writing. In ICT, we have created amazing looking pieces of work, which will one provide the skills needed to write application letters!

We have spent time outside, with Mr Chavez sharing some of his Basketball skills with the class, as well as preparing for the school's Sports Day. Beech Class

What an exciting two terms it has been in Beech class. We have had the pleasure of having some current students join our class and also a new student to the school join our class. As we always do in Beech, we have made them feel welcome and they are now so well gelled together, I struggle to remember Beech without them.

We have introduced social games to our morning routines, allowing children to discuss their emotions in a very positive way. This has also allowed us to develop our social skills of listening and turn taking. With such a enthusiastic response I look forward to continuing these next academic year.

In maths we have been working on fractions where the students were able to add, subtract, compare and order fractions. This was a shorter term, however we able to move on to the angles and shapes unit. The students were able to identify angles including right angles and recognise as a quarter of a turn. Though challenging at times, the students were also able to identify and draw parallel and perpendicular lines. We have also had the chance to explore different measures. The children were able to identify different units of measurement and were able to use a variety of scales. This was a very interactive unit and also the children learned a very important life skill.

Our English lessons have allowed us to explore poetry and also explanation texts. I thoroughly enjoyed our poetry unit where we learnt a poem about the lifecycle of a butterfly. This was even more enjoyable and relatable for the children as we managed to nurture our own caterpillars into chrysalis and then into butterflies. It was lovely as we named them and then set them free into nature.

I am so proud of all the hard work, academically and socially, that has taken place in Beech class. I feel privileged to have been part of this class and I know they will and truly earnt their summer break! See you next term team!

Short Breaks for children with disabilities - Parent & Carer Survey 2022

Bristol City Council are in the early stages of recommissioning their Short Breaks services. We are seeking the views of parents and carers of children and young people with Special Educational Needs or Disabilities via an <u>online survey</u> which is open until **Friday 22 July 2022**.

Short Breaks are activities for disabled children and young people and their families, that allow parent carers to have time out from their caring responsibilities. They also give disabled children and young people the opportunity to go places, spend time with friends, take part in fun and enjoyable activities, become more independent and try new things.

Early engagement with parents, carers, professionals, and young people is currently underway to understand what their priorities are and what services they would like to access. The feed-back will be used to develop formal proposals that will go out to public consultation later this year, with the aim to have recommissioned services in place by October 2023.


Family Hub

Families can now find free and paid for school holiday activities via the new Your Holiday Hub (YHH) website: Your Holiday Hub Bristol - Your Holiday Hub Bristol

The popular YHH programme is returning this summer offering children and young people hundreds of free, fun activities across Bristol over the six-week summer holiday. The new website means families can now search for school holiday activities - including free YHH places for children on free school meals (FSM) as well as paid for activities and clubs.

The new website makes it easier for families in Bristol to find holiday activities, all in one place, by conveniently searching what's available by location, age, or activity. Organisations offering activities can also access resources on the website as well as input and update the activities and clubs they are providing over the school holidays. The website will be updated for each holiday to reflect which activities are available over the summer, winter, and Easter school holidays.

YHH activities include cookery classes, sports, drama and learning about wildlife and the environment, and each four-hour holiday activity also includes a nutritious meal and food education
