Dear Parents and Carers,


This will be the last newsletter before the first of advent and the beginning of the busy festive period.

catering for younger viewers, they also provide motiental for more mature outlences. If you don't have parential controls set up on your soccurst, your child could find themselves being exposed to shows and movies with adult themse, atrong language and violence.

INCREASED SCREEN TIME

The array of content available through smart TV could lead to your child spending excessive array of time in hrant of the screen. Not only can protonged screen time distract from important activities such as behavior in report warred that endless hours in front of the bac can lead to headth problems including obselty, poor sleeping patterns and depression.

REMOTE-CONTROL RETAIL

Like many online devices, smart TVs localitate digital purchases: buying a new app or the latest season of a taroounte show, for exemple, if your child has access to a bank card and isn't restricted by spending controls on the system, they could run up a speakle bill through a smart TV fairly quite old enough to hully appreciate the value of money. As Internet of Things (b1) devices, smart TVs con be uniquely vulnerable to attack. Experts worm that internet-enabled TVs tend not to support high-level security software, so you won't always be oble to download strong antivirus programmes like you volution a phone or computer. Some smart TVs already collect data on users' viewing habits and then, display trageted datwettising based on that persinal information - while there have also been reports of instante- enabled TVs (and the apps installed on them) being used to "exoverdamp" on owners. Many smart TVs can be used for web browning, social media and live streaming – bit of which could sillow unknown users to contact your child (or vice versa). If your child engages with these functions of the TV, a stranger could potentially discover their contact information and potentially then use it to obtain even more sensitive personal details, such as your home address.

CREATE CHILD PROFILES

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Much like with smortproces and toblets, opps can be downloaded onto smort Tvs: from free containt piotforms such as BBC iPlayer to poid-for services like Prime Video. Most of these opps allow you to create a separate account for your child which has different setting to your own – suggesting more child-friendly material and reducing the possibility of them viewing explicit content.

CONSIDER THE LOCATION

If you're concerned about the online safety hazards that a smart TV might pase to your child, you could consider where in your home you put the device. The safest option would be to place the smart TV in a shared family space – so that on odult is usually nearby and able to supervise while your child's watching it – rather than in the relative privacy of a bedroom.
